Rebuilding a sweat lodge in Lower Kootenay

Nasu?kin Jason Louie hosted volunteers in Lower Kootenay to take apart and reconstruct a sweat lodge to be used for the community. The process began with removing blankets from the old lodge, which were washed and dried at a local laundromat to be used again on the new structure. Then the structure of branches that supported the blankets was taken apart and moved outside. These branches were piled and moved to a spot in the forest to be lain with other branches from previous sweat lodges, and an offering of tobacco was made.

The group then searched the surrounding forest for willow and maple branches to serve as the structure for the new lodge. The wood was selected for both its strength and flexibility to serve as the curved support structure for the round building. Seven primary branches were inserted into holes in the ground and tied together using sinew to form a solid structure. After adding additional branches for reinforcement, the lodge had a firm structure, ready to support the weight of the cleaned blankets layered upon each other and tied off to form the exterior of the lodge.

Outside of the building housing the sweat is a fire pit where rocks are heated and brought inside the lodge to produce the necessary heat. The lodge was completed in two days and was ready to host its first sweat on the second evening.

Land purchased for future site of Foundry East Kootenay

We are proud to announce the purchase of 100/106 12th Avenue South in Cranbrook as the future home of Foundry East Kootenay. Construction will begin this summer, with the facility set to open early 2022.

After considering several locations in Cranbrook, the 12th Avenue lot was chosen for its proximity to Mount Baker Secondary and Laurie Middle School and the opportunity to construct a new building design tailored to the needs identified by local youth and families.

KKCFSS' application to open and run a Foundry in the East Kootenay region was selected last summer. Foundry East Kootenay is part of a network of Foundry facilities throughout the province of British Columbia that provide health and wellness resources, services and supports for young people ages 12 to 24 and their families. The five core services offered are physical health, mental health, substance use support, social services and peer support.

Foundry East Kootenay will feature examination rooms, counselling spaces, a kitchen, and the opportunity for a green space. There will be health care and counselling staff on-site to provide free, confidential services without having to make an appointment ahead of time.

Applications open for Farmer's Market Nutrition Coupon Program in Cranbrook and Kimberley

If you are looking to add some from fresh nutritious food to your family's plate, you may be interested in participating in the Farmer's Market Nutrition Coupon Program in Cranbrook and Kimberley. The program is eligible for Indigenous individuals or families that are low income, pregnant or senior and are living in Cranbrook or Kimberley.

Participants will receive a book of coupons worth \$21 which can be used to purchase locally grown fruits, vegetables, herbs, dairy, eggs, nuts or meat from any vendors with a Nutrition Coupon Program poster.



The program runs on Saturdays at the Cranbrook Farmers Market in Rotary Park from June 26 to October 9 and Thursday evenings at the Kimberley Farmers Market downtown on Howard Street from June 24 to September 16.

Coupons will be available for pickup at the Nutrition Coupon Program booths in Cranbrook from 9:00 am – 11:00 am, and in Kimberley from 6:30 pm – 7:30 pm. If a participant does not pick up their coupons for two consecutive weeks they will be moved to the waitlist and their spot given to another participant.

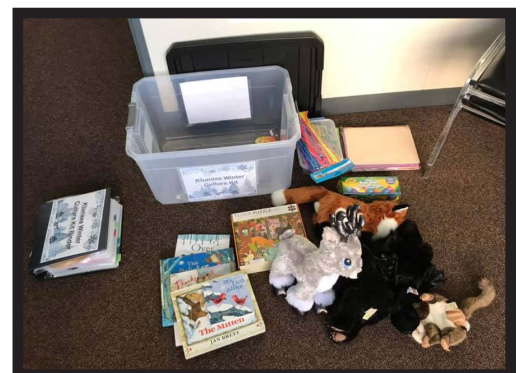
Looking for some activities to keep the little ones busy?

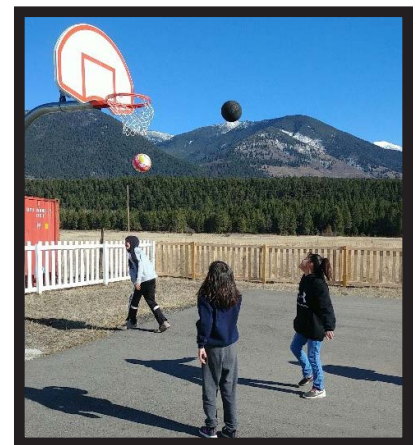
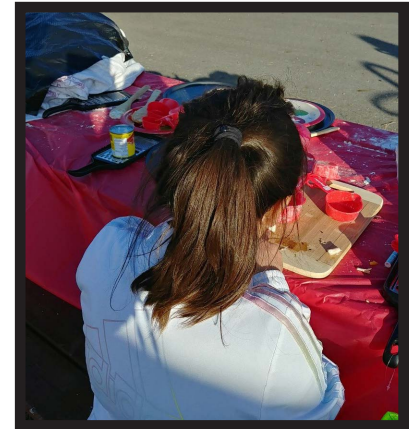
Outdoor fun to celebrate March Break and Easter in Tobacco Plains

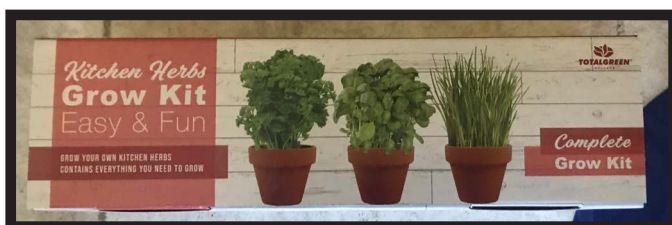

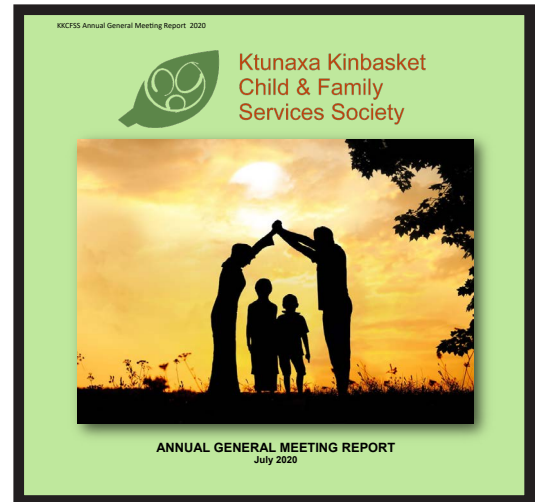

Purpose of Elders Advisory Council:

- May make internal decisions and approval of its own actions on a consensus building basis only.
- Act as an advisory council, exercising their collective wisdom and knowledge to reinforce the Vision and Mission statements of Ktunaxa Kinbasket Child and Family Services.
- Give priority to the cultural needs of the Children and Families that KKCFSS provides service to.
- Advise the KKCFSS Director of Practice and the employees of KKCFSS on issues concerning Indigenous programming and service delivery.
- Provide guidance, advice and support to strengthen the employees of KKCFSS in their work with Indigenous Children and Families, programming, and other cultural services.
- Assist in decisions regarding Indigenous languages, traditions and culture as it pertains to the service delivery of the Children and Families that receive services from KKCFSS.

Responsibilities of Elders Advisory Council:

- Provide vision, leadership and guidance to the employees on issues pertaining to culturally appropriate service delivery.
- Recommend, provide guidance and information on traditional knowledge, cultural and spiritual values.
- Assist in the education of the KKCFSS employees about Indigenous languages culture and traditions.
- Establish protocols for culturally appropriate behavior when working with the Ktunaxa, Métis and all other Indigenous people residing within Ktunaxa ʔamakʔis.
- Provide guidance and support to KKCFSS staff in strengthening their work with Indigenous Children and Families, programming and other cultural services.
- Provide input to the KKCFSS Board of Directors as requested.

The KKCFSS Elders Advisory Council are not responsible to act as mediators in case of conflict over cultural protocols, with the understanding that the protocols of this Elders Council are based on the cultural practices within Ktunaxa ʔamakʔis.

The KKCFSS Elders Advisory Council meets in Cranbrook a minimum of 4 times a year or at the call of the KKCFSS Director of Practice if there is a specific issue that requires immediate attention. Since March 2020 the Elders Advisory Council have been meeting by Zoom due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Elders Advisory Council operate by mutual consent if the decisions are needed to be made or specific information is required by persons seeking information.
